



10 There are two species of known alligators in the world, the American

Alligator and the Chinese Alligator. The American Alligator can be found in the wetlands of the Southern United States, in North America. These reptiles have been hunted for many years and at one point, were close to extinction. In order to protect this species, they were listed under the Endangered Species Act,



making hunting alligators illegal. Due to the efforts of the Endangered Species Act, the species has made a huge recovery and was taken off the endangered species list in 1987. Since the American Alligator population has repopulated so well, hunting and egg collecting is once again allowed.

11 On the other hand, the <u>Chinese Alligator</u> is a class one endangered species. The Chinese Alligator can be found in the <u>Sub</u> Tropical regions of China, in low lying areas such as rivers, streams, and marshes. This species of Alligator is classified as critically endangered because it has a decline in population greater than 80% in specific areas of population. The destruction of their habitats comes largely from the conversion of the lands they inhabit being used for agricultural purposes. The Chinese Alligator is very similar to the American Alligator in appearance. However, these reptiles are much smaller.



### **Referencing Sources**

In the beginning of the sentence

\* In the article <u>Freaky Frogs</u>, it states that "Scientists in Japan have produced seethrough frogs."

OR

At the end of the sentence in parenthesis

"Scientists in Japan have produced seethrough frogs" (Freaky Frogs).

## **Referencing Sources**

\* In <u>Source 3</u>, it states that scientist have found frogs that are see through.

OR



Scientists have found frogs that are see through (Source 3).

#### Referencing Sources

#### Are you listening?



#### You only need to reference <u>1 or 2 times</u> in each middle paragraph




#### A and B Sentences Own thoughts and ideas

Ex. They will be able to gather a lot of new information. This is going to help scientists in the future.







## **Transition Words**

- \* Try not to use 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>
- \* Use the medium and/or advanced transitions
- \* You <u>MUST</u> have transitions for R1, R2, R3 and conclusion



## Middle Paragraphs

- \* 1 quote (up to 2 quotes)
- Paraphrasing
- \* Own thoughts and ideas

#### In T1/R1, T2/R2, and T3/R3

#### You must use <u>REFERENCE YOUR SOURCE AT</u> <u>LEAST ONE TIME in each middle paragraph!</u>







## Try not use the same EBT more than once

For example, if you use "According to the author....." you can only use that phrase ONE TIME in your essay

#### When Referencing Sources...

#### YOU MUST STATE THE TITLE OF THE ARTICLE, AUTHOR, SOURCE # or page #, paragraph #

#### **EBT Phrases to Help you Reference**

- \* According to the text
- \* In paragraph 2
- In the first passage
- \* The author states
- Based on the information in the text
- \* In the article
- \* For example, in the text





#### **Informative vs Opinion**

The BIG difference

In an opinion essay, you MUST clearly STATE your opinion in ALL 5 paragraphs!

## You must FIGHT for your side the whole time!

Take a side and SUPPORT it.



## **Opinion Writing**

- \* Clearly state your OPINION in the introduction paragraph
- \* Clearly state your opinion in the TOPIC sentences for R1, R2 and R3
- \* Clearly state your opinion in the conclusion







#### When you hear....

"You have 10 minutes remaining"

# 1. Write 2-3 more sentences in your paragraph

2. Start writing your conclusion paragraph

\*This is only if you are not already on your conclusion\*





- \* Informative teach, explain to your reader and give information about a topic
- \* **<u>Opinion</u>** pick a side and stick to that side. Fight for your side and support it with evidence from the text.





# **Indent**

- \* Remember, DO NOT forget to **INDENT**
- \* Everyone should indent 5 times (once for each paragraph)
- \* Make sure you can see it



#### Capitalization and punctuation

- \* You have to capitalize and punctuate
- \* Don't forget



- \* Start every sentence with a capital letter
- \* End every sentence with a period, exclamation point, or question mark
- \* ALWAYS capitalize the letter "I" when it is alone



#### You are Ready!

- \* No matter what the prompt is....you are ready.
- \* You have practiced for many different prompts.





## You Are Ready For This



- \* You can do this
- \* Stay focused
- \* Find the key word
- \* Start writing and don't stop
- \* When you hear 10 minutes left, you know what to do
- If you are writing an informative, pick 3 topics to teach about
- \* If you are writing an opinion, pick 3 reasons to support your side



## **Last Minute Tips**



- \* Don't write big and sloppy
- \* If you start to write big and think you might run out of room, start writing real small.
- \* Keep an eye on time.
- \* Don't get stuck on the prompt, find your topics and reasons and start writing.


